110. Welcome and Introductions

Councillor Lakin welcomed everyone to the meeting and briefly introduced the members of the Wentworth South Area Assembly Team. Councillor Lakin advised that the theme of the next meeting would be Community Safety.

111. Apologies

Councillor Shaun Wright, Councillor Roger Stone, Councillor Glyn Whelbourn (all on other Council business). Apologies were also received from Ted Kelsie, Caroline Langston and Ruth - Fletcher Brown.

112. Theme of the Meeting: Town Centre Regeneration

Charles Hammersley from the Rotherham Investment and Development Office gave a power point presentation on Town Centre Regeneration and in particular the Public Realm Strategy. Before he began he advised the group that the document itself would be made available in all public libraries shortly, and that a period of public consultation was about to begin.

The presentation is attached as Appendix One.

113. Questions on the Theme

The Chair then asked the Group if they had any questions on the presentation.

A resident asked about the problems that Leeds Council currently faced in letting and selling properties which had been redeveloped and whether lessons had been learnt from this.

Charles Hammersley responded that this was a very good point. He suggested that lessons could be learnt from the experiences of other authorities. He reported that he was aware that a high percentage of the properties in the Rotherham project had already been sold, but he was unsure as to whether they had been sold to individuals or property developers.

A resident said that a central idea was to reclaim the riverside in Rotherham, but had this been considered when the new Primary Care Trust Building was erected.

Charles Hammersley responded that he was unsure about this specific site, but said that the area across the dual carriage-way, around the bus station, would be redeveloped in accordance with the principles of the public realm strategy.

A community representative suggested that spaces in the town centre attract crime and anti-social behaviour and wondered what role the Police had in advising and implementing the Strategy - in particular with regards to lighting and CCTV.

The group was advised that during the whole project a Police Architectural Liaison Officer called Andy Robinson had been heavily involved. Charles Hammersley suggested that in terms of CCTV and lighting, it was increasingly felt that lighting was the more successful deterrent to crime; as a result of this improved and appropriate lighting of areas was a major strand to the Public Realm Strategy.

A resident suggested that Rotherham Town Centre did not need improvements such as new trees or benches but rather required better shops.

The idea was put to the group that a major aim of the strategy was to attract shoppers and shopkeepers back into the town centre by creating a safe and attractive shopping space. In particular the eradication of a number of derelict buildings in the town centre – and the conversion of these back into shops would help to improve the environment.

A resident asked whether any work would be undertaken at the site of Tesco's.

Charles Hammersley stated that the Forge Island Tesco site was being looked at as a proposed site for cultural activities, such as a library and arts centre. The Group suggested that it would improve the town centre if Tesco expanded and improved its store. Charles Hammersley concurred with this viewpoint but stated that Tesco would need a suitable town centre location to re-locate to before the site could be redeveloped. In the short-term this seemed unlikely, but the Tesco site was one which R.M.B.C were interested in for future development purposes.

Jackie Ingham asked about the formal consultation period and in particular wanted to know how community members could get involved in the process.

The Group heard that the document would soon be available in all public libraries and on the Council Website. Charles Hammersley said that if residents contacted him he would be more than happy to send it out in CD format; a decision had been made to restrict the number of hardcopies due to the price of each, but if required these could also be sent out to individuals.

The Chair said that he would like further information on the spatial hierarchy plan so that a breakdown of the three impact areas was available.

Charles Hammersley suggested that this information would be included in the Public Realm Strategy document itself. He suggested that he could report back to the Chair on the particular intricacies of the plan and in particular on the location of impact areas.

The Chair thanked the group for their questions and thanked Charles Hammersley for attending the meeting.

114. Herringthorpe Playing Fields

Steve Hallsworth (Leisure Services Manager), delivered a presentation on the proposals to develop the Herringthorpe Leisure site. Phil Rogers (Director of Culture and Leisure) attended to help in answering public questions. Before the presentation began Steve Hallsworth stressed to the group that all the ideas being discussed were at a preliminary stage, and that no definite decision on the proposals had been made by the Council. Furthermore this was only the first phase of an information giving process and if a decision was made to take the proposals any further there would need to be more detailed work along with further information and consultation with members of the public.

Steve Hallsworth also advised that the presentation offered virtually the same information as a leaflet which had been distributed to those homes in the immediate area; if anyone had not seen or received a copy of this leaflet, Leisure and Greenspaces had provided some for the meeting which could be taken away.

The presentation is attached as Appendix Two.

115. Questions on the Theme

The Chair then asked the Group if they had any questions to ask.

A resident suggested that at a public meeting which occurred at the Leisure centre some years ago, he had been informed that no further building would take place on the playing fields in the next 30 years. He had asked for this response to be minuted.

Phil Rogers suggested that he believed that Councillor Hussain had written to the resident concerned. On hearing that the resident had received no further correspondence Phil Rogers asked for his name and address and stated that he would contact him shortly.

A resident suggested that alternatives to pulling down the leisure centre complex had not been fully examined. In other authorities local community Groups had taken over buildings and made them viable.

Phil Rogers stated that a major problem with this community led approach was the large amount of funding which was required. He also suggested that Rotherham had plans for four other new leisure centres across the borough, in partnership with D.C Leisure, which would ensure the long-term future of Rotherham's sporting and recreational facilities.

The resident responded that was effectively a closed shop where only council/D.C leisure owned centres would be supported.

Phil Rogers and Steve Hallsworth responded by saying that far from a 'closed shop' the council would not block any private leisure company from opening a centre in Rotherham; the council will not, however, develop other centres outside the existing agreement as it would be effectively creating its own competition. Phil Rodgers stated that Sport England used Rotherham as an example of Good Practice for other authorities' leisure development models. This policy secured and protected the future of investment in leisure and recreation against the background of changing council budgets. This would ensure a high standard of centre was created and also that the centres would be maintained to an appropriate level.

Phil Rogers went onto assure the group that pricings for new leisure facilities would be agreed in association with R.M.B.C and as such that the price to use the facilities would aim to be inclusive and attractive to the people of Rotherham.

Councillor Dave Pickering said that he was fully supportive of the notion of a community group taking on and running a redundant building. He suggested, however, that two things should be questioned. Firstly, could an existing community group really cover the high costs of making a building such as Herringthorpe Leisure Centre fit for purpose; Secondly, does a community group exist in Rotherham with infrastructure, size and capacity to take on such a resource.

A resident suggested that she believed given the opportunity a community group could run the centre and expressed the opinion that other sources of funding such as Lottery funding had been ignored. Phil Rogers and Steve Hallsworth responded by saying they did not think lottery or any other significant funding would be available.

What percentage of land currently on the site will be lost to housing and how will the Council guarantee that further encroachment will not occur in the future?

Phil Rogers suggested that in terms of a percentage he was unsure but sought to remind the group that the two specific sites in question were not currently used as playing fields.

A resident suggested that there was an understanding that the land was promised to the people of Rotherham for leisure and recreation and therefore should not be built upon.

The Culture and Leisure representatives suggested that Council's legal team had looked into the claims of a covenant prohibiting building on the site and had found no such legally binding arrangement. Phil Rogers also challenged the notion that these housing developments would inhibit leisure and recreation in Rotherham suggesting that the proposals would act as a catalyst for a £7 or £8 million investment in sport across the Borough; preliminary discussions had show support for the ideas from the Football Association, Rotherham Titans, Rotherham Hockey and Rotherham Harriers who would all benefit from improved facilities. The money raised from the sale of the adjacent sites would also finance, or part-finance, the 'Playing Pitch Strategy' which has identified five key sites across the borough for improvements to pitch surfaces and facilities.

Phil Rogers stressed again to the group that Culture and Leisure welcomed all opinions and ideas about the proposals, but at this stage the plans were not definite. This was the very first phase and the council would have to agree to the concept of housing on the site before any detailed plans would be drawn up. The initial feedback from forums such as this, and visits to other groups and other Area Assemblies, would be fed back to councillors to inform their decision; if it is passed for further action the public would be consulted and any complaints or problems could be raised in the appropriate planning routes.

A resident asked where swimming facilities will be available.

Steve Hallsworth suggested that town centre swimming pool will be located next to the Saint Ann's Centre roundabout and is due to open in November. This pool will provide improved facilities for swimming alongside those at Aston (which should be

complete by September), Wath (which should be complete by December), and Maltby (which will be completed next year).

How many houses will be built on the proposed sites?

Phil Rogers suggested that houses will not go beyond the areas, hatched in the map in Red. It is too early to say what will be the layout of the developments or how many houses there will be as planning would need to access each individual area.

Councillor Simon Currie stated that he had a question from Valley Juniors Football Club. The youngsters were very excited and supportive of the proposed improvements to the playing fields. They wanted to know whether there was a possibility for the inclusion of any small sized pitches suitable for younger children.

Steve Hallsworth suggested that he had met with Valley Juniors at a meeting Herringthorpe Leisure centre. In terms of the creation of a small sized pitch he suggested that pitch allocation and layout was reviewed season to season in relation to demand and uptake.

Councillor Simon Currie also wondered about the provision for girls sports such as netball.

Steve Hallsworth suggested that the all weather facility could be used for netball and hockey. The new facilities would be overseen by Sports Development whose aim was to include as many people as possible in sporting activities. In future Steve Hallsworth suggested that one possibility was that the Sports Development Team could be based at the site.

A resident produced a cutting from the Rotherham Advertiser which suggested that there was a living descendant of the owner who placed a covenant on the land.

Phil Rogers suggested that the legal team had found no such covenant or legally binding document which prohibited building on the site.

Steve Hallsworth stressed that the only two sites under discussion for development were the footprint of the leisure centre and the nursery site.

A resident questioned whether leaflets had been distributed to every house in the surrounding area, stating that the only one he had seen was on the counter of a paper shop.

Steve Hallsworth stated that Culture and Leisure had worked with each Area Assembly to distribute leaflets. Jackie Ingham advised that the Wentworth South Area Assembly had picked up 500 leaflets, and distributed them in the streets of the neighbourhoods within Wentworth South, and adjacent to the playing fields.

Councillor Russell advised that she had been involved in a day of free activities organised at the existing leisure centre. She suggested that the turn-out from the

community had been extremely disappointing and suggested that efforts must be made to encourage residents to use leisure facilities as much as possible.

An informal vote was taken on whether it was a good idea in principle to develop part of the playing fields. A majority indicated that they believed that it would be positive.

116. Minutes and Matters Arising from the Area Assembly meeting held on 7th February 2008

Minutes passed as an accurate record of the meeting with amendments to page 3, paragraph 2, where concessionary was spelt incorrectly and to page 5, paragraph 6, where digression should have read discretion.

Councillor Pickering thanked the Area Assembly Team for producing such detailed and comprehensive minutes.

Jackie Ingham briefly discussed some of the major issues listed on the Action Table.

It was suggested that further action had been taken regarding the Ravenfield Crossroads. It was advised that Planning & Transportation had recommended the preparation of a highway improvement scheme including right turn lanes at Moor lane North and Moor Lane South, and the widening of Braithwell Road and Hollings Lane on the approach to the crossroads, and that traffic lights should be considered in the scheme design with appropriate facilities for right and left turning traffic.

An inter-agency meeting took place in Valley Park on the 14th February to begin to address issues here. Groundwork Dearne Valley and key partners, including friends of Valley Park, organised a successful 5 a side tournament which took place in the MUGA. The Friends of Valley Park, Sports Development and Youth Services are seeking to run a regular multi-sports event. Furthermore the SNT reassurance leaflet has been produced and it will be delivered to homes surrounding Valley Park shortly. The Green Spaces allotment officer has also visited the area to assess the fencing. A similar meeting for Rosehill Park has been arranged for the 10th April.

117. Area Chair's Update

A summary was given of the key pieces of work the Area Assembly team had been involved in since the last Area Assembly meeting in February.

Through Charing the Neighbourhood Action Group, a whole range of inter-agency activities had resulted in successes in neighbourhoods with key crime problems.

Actions including additional targeted patrols, letters to parents, anti-social behaviour contracts, target hardening hotspots, engagement and diversionary actions with young people, Impact Weeks, and the delivery of Smartwater to burglary hotspots there had been reductions of 25 % of crime and asb in one particular area and 12% in another.

The launch of the police bikes initiative took place in March, and had had some initial key successes, increasing the visibility of PCSOs and enabling them to get to less accessible areas, and often much quicker.

Nine young people from Wentworth South took part in the last week in February, a 5 day long Local Intervention Fire Education Course. Funded through the Area Assembly, the project lets young people find out what it's like to be a fire fighter, and learn teamwork, motivation, attendance and punctuality, first aid and basic fire fighting skills. The course is aimed at young people seen as at risk of offending, and has enjoyed some real successes, with few of those completing the course re-offending.

Throughout March we organised three very successful Community Clean Ups in three areas in the Wentworth South area – the Fight Cocks/Canyon area, Rawmarsh, East Herringthorpe and Middle Avenue, Rawmarsh. Leaflets were delivered to properties in the areas. Residents were informed that they could dispose of white goods, green waste and non-recyclable waste as well as get involved in litter picks to improve their own areas.

Neighbourhood Wardens, Junior Wardens, parents, Area Assembly staff, Groundwork Dearne Valley staff and, Deputy Mayor, Councillor Ann Russell got stuck in and cleaned up the area around the Fighting Cocks Public House and the footpath on Ryecroft sports ground. More than 15 sacks of rubbish were removed. The Junior Wardens also removed graffiti and repainted “No Litter” and “No Dog Fouling” signs.

In the East Herringthorpe area the Post Office and Davy Lamp car park area were litter picked, and lots of residents brought old white goods for disposal. The wardens cleaned up a local play area and gennel.

In Middle Avenue, 2010 staff, Neighbourhood Wardens and Area Assembly staff loaded up the Neighbourhood Warden's van several times to help residents who didn't have access to a vehicle to dispose of white goods, non-recycable waste and green waste.

Work has started supporting Thrybergh Parish Council to produce a Parish Plan.

A Thrybergh Parish Plan Steering Group has been set up. The aim of the Group is to produce a Plan that identifies needs/priorities in Thrybergh and how, when and by whom they will be addressed.

A group of 15 young people from across our area will get together once a month to hold their own ‘Wentworth South Young Peoples Assembly’. The Young People will help develop the Young Peoples section of the Area Plan to improve services for young people in our area, and will contribute in sections of our regular newsletter, and on the Area Assembly website. The launch of the Area Assembly will take place on 6th May in Dalton Youth Centre.

Working groups have been set up to develop actions to address the priorities that came out of the consultation carried out by the Area Assembly Team over the

summer. These actions will go into the next Wentworth South Area Plan. Progress on the plan will be reported to future meetings. Anyone interested in getting involved, is invited to contact the Area Assembly Team, at the Millside office.

The team is producing a newsletter every two months, and again anyone with ideas for articles is asked to get in touch. The website should be launched by the end of April.

118. Update Reports from Services

2010 Update

Colette Williams gave a presentation to the 2010 group and this is attached under Appendix Three.

Councillor Pickering thanked Colette for such a comprehensive verbal report. He asked that in future that the report be forwarded to the Area Assembly Office in time for it to be posted out with the rest of the papers. 2010 could then provide an update on actions in the intervening period.

Safer Neighbourhood Team update delivered by Inspector Steve Tattershall

Steve Tattershall began by outlining some year end statistics for Wentworth South including:

- Overall crime in the Safer Neighbourhood Area down by 4.5%
- Domestic Burglary down by 18.8% in the Wentworth South Area. Steve Tattershall believed that the Smartwater project combined with the 'no cold-calling zone' schemes had contributed to this.
- Vehicle crime down by 8.7%

Steve Tattershall also suggested that the Police Bikes were beginning to make a really positive impact. They responded first to a break in at Foljambe Drive Junior and Infant School ensuring that an arrest could be made. The bikes were also first to respond to a robbery on the Vales estate where workers were attacked. One male involved has received 4 ½ years custodial sentence and the other has received 2 years.

Action has been taken against a large group of young people involved in ASB at Rosehill Park. Acceptable Behaviour Contracts (ABCs) have been issued and two young people have been processed for offences.

A vehicles operation has been carried out on Aldwarke Road. 12 vehicles were seized due to a lack of insurance, and 2 were seized as they were being run on red diesel.

Over two days in February 11 drugs warrants were executed. There were several arrests and £3000 worth of drugs seized.

Over a two week period, toward the end of February, there was a spate of burglaries in the Rawmarsh area. Additional, targeted night patrols were put in place and following a burglary on Dale Road a man was caught in possession of stolen goods. He has been charged with several offences and is currently in prison.

A Thrybergh man, with previous convictions for drugs offences, has been caught with a quantity of heroin and cocaine. He has received an 8 ½ year prison sentence.

Steve Tattershall also gave a flavour of the work carried out by PCSOs. They have issued 19 notices in relation to nuisance motorbikes, seized 18 bikes/quads, recovered 16 untaxed vehicles, confiscated 150 units of alcohol and assisted with 15 arrests.

Wardens and Junior Wardens update delivered by Craig Cornwall

The wardens have responded to 62 complaints since the last meeting. 6 of these were for drugs litter, which Craig Cornwall noted were all at separate addresses. 4 fixed penalty reports have been issued for fly tipping and the wardens have been heavily involved in tackling issues around Valley and Rosehill Park. The wardens have also participated in three very successful community clean ups across the area.

The Junior wardens also received a visit from a Zimbabwean arts group. Craig Cornwall suggested that further progress had been made on the Wardens bike project, CCTV scheme and Newsletter.

Streetpride Update

Christian Hayes delivered a verbal update on the end of year projects and this is attached as appendix 4. With regards to the Brown signs in Valley park Chris Hayes suggested that Streetpride had ordered these and they should be in place shortly.

Councillor Pickering suggested that Streetpride just be thanked for doing a very good job on Breck Lane.

Chris Hayes advised that he had a new role in Streetpride so this would be his last Wentworth South Area Assembly. The Chair thanked Chris for all his hard work and wished him luck in his new role.

119. Questions from the Public

Councillor Lakin then invited questions from the group.

A community representative raised concerns on behalf of the residents in non-traditional housing in Claypit Lane. The residents suggested that they urgently wanted clarification and were waiting for a letter to be delivered.

It was reported that there had been a re organisation within Neighbourhood and Adults Services and a new team had been put into place who are to lead on the review of the non traditional properties. The Valley Ward members had a meeting with Sharon Pederson who assured them that a letter would be sent out to all

relevant residents informing them of this change. Councillor Pickering advised that this issue should be investigated as a matter of urgency by the relevant officers and that a standard letter should be sent out; Councillor Pickering further suggested that a copy of the letter should be sent to the resident who raised the issue so she had the information.

A community representative also raised concerns about the steps near the doctors in Rawmarsh suggesting that these were dangerous, and also 'fly-tipping' along the StageCoach boundary.

Chris Hayes advised that he had arranged for Streetpride to clear litter from the steps and that the site was to be added to the lengthsman schedule.

The resident responded that it was compacted leaf litter and the steps surface which were the major concern.

Chris Hayes suggested that it was not in Streetpride's power to repair the steps and that the owner 'JobLot' would have to take responsibility. Chris Hayes suggested that he had written to JobLot asking for the steps to be cleaned.

With regards to the Stagecoach depot issues, Chris Hayes read an email which he had received from Alan Ashmore, Environmental Health. This suggested that at a recent meeting a representative for StageCoach, Mr. Jowett the Engineering Director, had indicated that Stagecoach would take responsibility for the site. Streetpride and Environmental Health would therefore provide a quote for works to be carried out and StageCoach would cover the cost.

A community representative raised concerns about the poor state of the Bellows Road pavement near the old people's complex. The resident suggested that someone could fall.

It was agreed that Streetpride would look into this site and provide feedback at the next Area Assembly.

A resident suggested that action should be taken against an address on Middle Lane South which was involved in fly tipping. In particular the path that goes to the leisure centre was almost blocked by Conifer cuttings

Chris Hayes advised that Streetpride had already been made aware of this site by another resident and the area would be investigated and a report fed back to the next meeting.

The same resident advised that action needs to be taken on the alley way between Marlowe Drive and Chaucer Road. It was suggested that people under the influence of alcohol were urinating in this area, that it was dark and felt unsafe and that dog fouling was a major issue.

Chris Hayes advised that Streetpride would visit the area and report back to the next Area Assembly.

A resident said that they had been informed the crematorium had been taken over and the field next door, which borders the park, would be developed. Did anyone have any information on this?

Councillor Dave Pickering who is Chair of the Planning Board suggested that this would not be a housing development rather an extension of the current crematorium/grave yard. He suggested that further information on the impact of the park would be fed back at the next meeting.

A community resident raised an issue about the entrance to the old pit site in Silverwood. Previously the entrance had been blocked to stop off road motor biking. Recently, however, trees either side had been removed and the area was now easily accessible again.

The Chair advised that Paul Spivey would be informed and relevant action should be taken to ensure that access is limited.

A resident from Kilnhurst who lives next to the B690 advised that residents had great concerns about the noise and vibrations being made by large lorries passing over nearby speed bumps. It was suggested that if traffic calming measures were required then a traffic calming sign, such as that at Ravenfield may be better in this location than speed bumps.

The Chair advised that the relevant officers should be informed and that an update should be prepared for the next Area Assembly meeting.

A resident suggested that if parking outside the Town Hall was free after 6:00 would it not make sense to start Area Assembly Meetings at 6:15.

This proposal was agreed and future meetings will begin at 6:15.

Two residents from Bramley Grove in Rawmarsh explained their concerns about the area surrounding their homes. One of the residents produced a hypodermic needle which had been found in their garden. The residents related to the group the problems that they had with drug litter, drug dealing, fly tipping, graffiti and dog fouling. The residents wanted to know what could be done by the SNT and the Area Assembly to improve the situation.

The Chair expressed his concerns at the extent of these problems. Craig Cornwall suggested that the wardens had a four hour response period to pick up drug litter and offered to take the needle and dispose of it accordingly. The SNT advised that they were aware of issues in this area and that they were aware of problem families in the vicinity. A drugs dog had visited the site, and despite finding evidence of drug use such as tin foil no drugs were recovered. Steve Tattershall stated that he would raise the area and the problems mentioned at the next SNT staff meeting. Jackie Ingham advised due to the severity of the problems described this should be a priority and asked both residents to wait behind to exchange contact details. The issues of the area would also be discussed at the Neighbourhood Action Group.

A resident asked if anyone present had any information on the LINKS health forum. It was suggested to members of the disbanded PPI that R.M.B.C would be heavily involved with LINKS. It was suggested that there was a gap between the end of one program and the beginning of the other.

The Area Assembly Office advised that they would contact Ruth Fletcher-Brown of the PCT to see if they could obtain any further information, and Julie Slatter from Chief Executives, RMBC.

A resident suggested that they lived in a grey area between two area assemblies on Bawtry Road. She raised concerns about the speed of cars on the road and suggested that a speed camera may be necessary.

The Chair advised that more detail was required about the specific site and its problems. He asked the resident to give specific details to the Area Assembly team, that relevant officers should be notified and further information should be fed-back at the next meeting.
